A Coach's Perspective

I've been in the crew and coaching game for awhile, but nothing quite prepared me for working with CWRU's women rowers. For one thing, most of them are science majors; make a reference to a major national historical event more than 10 years ago and you get blank looks.

For another, they spend more time in front of their computers than any students I've ever seen. Got a friend in the room next door? Don't step in the hall to tell her something - - IM. Always, IM. Want to see the new movie Chicago? Download off the wonderful super-server CWRU's spanking new wireless network allows - - it'll only take about 3 minutes.

Now I was a history major -- didn't take a single math class all four years and proud of it. And with my 56k dialup modem, it takes me at least 5 minutes to download a single song. So yes, now and then we didn't quite "get" one another's lingo. Perhaps the most painful example for me: I'm trying to get the ladies to accelerate their finishes big-time, and it's just not happening. So I use an old stand-by, "Bring that oar to you like it's Brad Pitt."

One woman literally stuck out her tongue in disgust. "He's SOOO OLD." (Which is exactly how I felt in that moment.)

Ultimately we bridged the generation and humanitiesmath/science gap because the young women who joined the team last year and I shared an overwhelming passion for this beautiful sport. They trudged through the snow 5 days a week for winter training at Veale. They stroked through pouring rains and Cleveland's coldest spring in memory. And yes, they came home with impressive hardware. Freshman Erin Brandt won second place in the women's open event at the Hammer Ergatta, with a 7:47.5, while freshman Katherine Allen - - recovering from an ACL torn in November - - won the novice women category in the same race with a 7:46.1. A novice 4+ placed second at the Jack Speakmon in Columbus, first at the Red Hawk Sprints in Oxford, Ohio and third at Governor's Cup in West Virginia. The Varsity 4+ placed second at Red Hawk, while the Varsity Pair of Brandy Hedger and Lindsey Schilling placed second at Governor's Cup.

For the women, the year's highlight probably was the Dad Vail regatta, where the Novice 4+ of Allen, Brandt, Hillary Emer, Shannon Armstrong and coxswain Tanujai Pillai won their heat by several lengths of open water. The ladies earned that sweet victory through an awful lot of work during the year, but also had hidden weapons:

Several attendees have worked hard over the summer to ensure an even stronger showing come next spring.

The varsity's fall season kicks off with the first practice Aug. 23. Our first major goal is to take the both the men's and women's Open 4+ sprints at the Head of the Cuyahoga, a feat that would gain the program two new coxboxes. Of course, first we have to qualify for those sprints by virtue of finish in the actual HOTC head race. Translation: the ladies will be working their tails off the first four weeks of school. If you're in town for the racing Sept. 20, please make sure they hear you - - they appreciate every cheer.
